





A History of WECSSO (part 4) Windsor Essex County Senior Sports Organization By Paul Thomas



LET'S ORGANIZE FINANCES

As indicated above, although the financial picture was rosy, problems arose. The board quickly took care of the frivolous requests for funding by setting protocol. The membership, however, quickly discovered that if their requests for funds were turned down or reduced by the WECSSO Board, they could just go to the WRSA board to get the funds they wanted. **DOUG SMITH,** who was the first president of the WRSA Board of Directors, was unaware of the decisions made by WECSSO, and would fill their requests. The two boards got together and decided that all requests for funds would be handled by WECSSO, and the WRSA would save their income for future use (see below).

LET'S BUILD OUR OWN FACILITY

Another of the problems that arose had to do with facilities. Slo-pitch was played one place, winter slo-pitch was in another, the hockey players were in another facility, and volleyball took place in still another, etc. etc. Our members were playing all over the city. They had no way to get together for social purposes- one of the main objectives set out by Tom Simpson in his original plan. We needed our own facility.

As described above, it was decided, between the two organizations, that WECSSO would use its income to fund all activities, and that WRSA would bank its income, to be used for the purpose of building or purchasing our own facility. The rosy picture of bingo income, plus donations and grants from various sources, made this a distinct possibility in only a few years. Several fund seeking meetings were held with municipal, provincial, and federal government officials, and they all gave tacit approval. The city, in particular, wanted to be involved. Furthermore, efforts were made to obtain "charitable donation status" for us. We went so far, with the city's help, to bidding on the Ice Park. It has two ice pads, and the thought was that we could make one of the pads into a giant field house, and take care of virtually all of our sports at one place, plus it had a licensed dining area that would have been ideal for the socializing that everyone felt was so important. Sadly, another bid was accepted

Another exciting attempt was with the City. We were using all the facilities at the Forest Glade Recreational Center - ice rinks, ball fields, tennis courts, gymnasium, and their canteen set-up. Both WECSSO and WRSA were so pleased with the Forest Glade set-up that they decided to make arrangements with Parks & Recreation of Windsor to use Forest Glade as a base facility, and to use the funds accumulated from the bingos, which had grown to a considerable amount, to help construct the facilities that were missing, namely, a proper gymnasium or field house, and a swimming pool. We went so far as to issue a cheque for several thousand dollars to show that we were serious about this and to get things started. The city director held the cheque for several days for fear that the plan wouldn't fly- and sadly, he was correct. The Gaming Commission Rules would not permit this to happen. The money gained from the bingo sessions was supposed to be spent on the listed charity for the bingo license. It couldn't be saved. The point was that if

all the money wasn't needed for the particular charity functions, then the number of bingos should be cut down and given to other charities. Our excitement was in vain. The year was 1999.

LET'S SPLIT

Things were going along splendidly as far as activities and funding were concerned, but there was a dark cloud on the horizon. The WRSA executive apparently felt that their efforts, sponsoring the 50-55 slo-pitch group, were being overshadowed by WECSSO; and 'they were going to take over several of the activities'. This wasn't a proposal, nor a request, nor a suggestion; it was a very strong statement that derived a belligerent reaction. After some heated discussions, it was decided that WECSSO would sponsor slo-pitch solely, and that WRSA would sponsor everything else.

This was a good split, slo-pitch was so big by this time that its financial requirements equaled all of the other activities. Some joint meetings between the two executive boards were held, but these meetings ended up with threats, insults, and hard feelings, for whatever reasons. And so the two boards virtually cut off all relations, and this separation has continued ever since. It all was and is very hard to understand, and is quite foolish. The membership of the two groups is the same. The only difference is the make-up of the executives, and, strangely, all of the WRSA executive members are members of WECSSO. They are all good friends except when the WECSSO-WRSA relationship comes up.

LET'S USE THE SANDCASTLE

About this time, the SANDCASTLE took on new ownership, and it needed customers. We were approached, and WRSA got strongly involved. It proved to be wonderful move. Volleyball, basketball, squash, handball, racquet-ball, fitness classes, etc. were now available and under one roof, and they flourished. An outstanding floor was installed and both organizations paid for it. This 'contribution' to the Sandcastle was in lieu of any charges for the use of the facilities, so the Sandcastle became the 'headquarters' for senior sports and activities in this area. This was the last relationship between WECSSO and WRSA. Sad.

LET'S GROW

Over the years, the WECSSO programs have grown and continued to grow. Not all of the programs are sports or athletics, but they include activities designed to be of interest and service to our seniors.

SPORTS

SLO-PITCH: This sport has been the instigator of the entire program. It has grown from a few guys playing Scrub Ball to a well-established Slo-Pitch league with three different divisions according to ability and schedules. There are play-offs, championships, end-of-season banquets, awards, etc. Diamonds from all over the city have been used, including: Jackson Park, Walker Homesites, Forest Glade, Ice Park, and The Ciociaro Club.

The sport has its own elected executive which handles all aspects of the league. Basic uniforms are supplied as is all equipment. Game results are reported in the newspaper. Teams have played in outside tournaments and championships with outstanding results. There is no fee to play slo-pitch.

There is a fee to cover the banquet and the Appreciation luncheon. The reason for the fee is planning the affairs - otherwise the board wouldn't know how many people to plan for.

UMPIRES: Bill SCHEUERMANN developed an umpiring crew to answer the frequent arguments that came up with players umpiring their own games. He had rules meetings and developed a protocol regarding positioning, handling protests, etc. This really upgraded the play of the league, and made for a much classier setting.

VOLLEYBALL: Volleyball was the second of the sports to be a part of our organization. It started at Lincoln Road United Church, then transferred to Sand castle, and hence to the Windsor Family Credit Union facility. It was the first of our sports to include women, and eventually there has been a men's league, a women's league, and a co-ed league. In addition, our teams have participated in outside competition, include the Senior Games where several gold, and other medals have been won.

HOCKEY: This has been on-going on a 'rec' league basis and is steady. Not having our own facility has heldit back because of the cost of ice-rentals. There are a number of ex-hockey players in our membership, and they keep the sport going. This sport, too, has participated in outside tournaments. It is limited, but thrilling for those who participate.

BOWLING: Teams have been sponsored in local bowling leagues over the years, and this sports attracts died-in-the-wool participants In addition, one of the big events on our calendar is the charity bowlathon.

TENNIS: Tennis has had its moments. There have been some years where several men and women have used the courts at Forest Glade, and then there are years with little interest. Many of the men players also play slo-pitch, and that takes most of their interest.

GOLF: Golf, like tennis, has had its moments. There have been some organized outings which have gone quite well but there isn't much of a follow through. The avid golfers play at their own clubs quite apart from us.

BADMINTON: This sport went very well when the Sandcastle was in operation, but now it pretty much goes its own way. There is no doubt that it will flourish if and when we have our own facility.

PICKLEBALL: This is the newest sport to 'come on board', and it has experienced amazing growth. It is a wonderful game that can be played by all ages and sexes. When we have access to our own facility, this sport should become a mainstay. At present it is being played at various gyms throughout the city with our group meeting at the Riverside Baseball Complex. Our female members have really taken to this sport, and are very much responsible for its growth.

ICE SKATING: There was free public ice skating for seniors at Forest Glade, and Tom Simpson not only joined the group, he brought the entire group to us and us to them. There was no cost, and these people turned out great in helping with bingos and other things.

BASKETBALL: A small, but dedicated group of men and women, have participated in basketball over the years. They started out at Sandcastle, then went to the Windsor Family Credit Union facility, and later, to the University of Windsor. They, particularly the women, have participated in team and 3-on-3 events all over the world, and have won world championships!!

LINE DANCING, AEROBICS, FITNESS CLASSES, ETC.: The Ladies Auxiliary has been a very active group. They have joined in several of the activities on a co-ed basis; and then have developed activities of their own as well.

2. One out, runners on 1st and 3rd. The batter flies out to right field for the 2nd out. The

runner on 3rd tags up and scores after the catch. The runner from 1st attempts to return to first base but the right fielder's throw beats him to the base. Three outs. But the runner from 3rd scored before the throw doubled off the runner from first. Does the run count?

What's the call?

3. With runners on 1st and 3rd, and one out, the batter hits a high pop fly behind 2nd base. The 2nd baseman camps under the ball, then steps aside and deliberately allows it to fall untouched. The batter, assuming he would be an easy out, does not run on the play. The 2nd baseman picks up the ball and fires it to the 1st baseman who tags the runner on 1st, then the base.

What's the call?



- 3-4 garlic cloves minced
- 1 (29 ounce) can tomato sauce

- 1 6 oz. can tomato paste
- 2 pounds chopped cabbage
- 1 cup uncooked long grain white rice
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon sage
- 1 teaspoon pepper
- 3 cups water (may need more)

Instructions



Bring the vinegar and sugar to a boil and simmer until the sugar is dissolved

Place the cloves, cinnamon and ginger in a bag

Add to the syrup and boil 5 minutes

Add the pumpkin and bring the mixture

Boil over LOW heat for EXACTLY 25 minutes, stirring often

Remove the spice bag

Place the pumpkin in sterilized jars, pour the vinegar MIXTURE on top to completely

Cover and seal



Easy Beef Stroganoff Submitted by Carla Johnson-Hicks

- 3 medium onions, coarsely chopped (about 1 1/2 cups)
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 2 lbs. boneless beef (Round Roast works great) cubed, fat removed
- 1 Cup beef broth
- $2\ (10\mbox{-}3/4\mbox{-}ounce)$ cans Campbell's® Condensed Cream of Mushroom Soup
- 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
- 1 (8-ounce) package sliced white mushrooms (about 3 cups) (canned work as well)
- 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 1 cup sour cream
- 1 (12-ounce) package medium egg noodles (about 7 cups), cooked and drained

Saute the onions and garlic, place in a casserole dish. Brown beef, drain add to casserole. Add beef broth and Worcestershire sauce and bake in oven at 350 for 1 to 2 hours, until beef is tender. (If broth has not absorbed, use a small bit of cornstarch mixed with cold water to thicken). Cook noodles according to package, during the last 15 minutes of baking, if using fresh mushrooms, sauté, then add to casserole. Heat a few minutes longer. Add sour cream just before serving. You can add noodles to casserole dish or ladle over noodles on the plate.


